

PRESIDENT'S **REPORT**

Density Bonusing Went to Council on May 25?

At the time of writing this column, we do not yet know the outcome of this matter. To summarize, Density Bonusing was being considered for a proposed development to replace the houses located at 306, 308, 310 and 312 - 25 Avenue SW. The applicant requested approval for increasing the height limit from the currently approved 15 metres to the proposed 24 metres. If this application is approved, then density bonusing may also be approved. "Density Bonusing" is a system of exchange that allow variances to the approved Land Use (aka zoning) in exchange for the provision of certain amenities that fill an identified need and benefit the community.

The applicant requested a deferral from March 9 to May 11. However, at the time of writing this, City Administration had not completed their report, so it appears this matter will now be deferred to May 25 to be considered by Council. A meeting was held with the applicant on April 16. While we appreciate the opportunity for dialogue, we did not hear anything that would benefit the community as a whole.

We have provided each Council member with a copy of the report resulting form our community consultation held on February 18 along with a summary letter stating our position on this matter. While we remain opposed to this proposal, Council may decide otherwise and if they do, there will be a need to deal with the mechanics of density bonusing. We will let you know of any change or outcome in the next newsletter.

Mature Trees Update

We had a meeting with Urban Forestry of The City of Calgary on April 27 to discuss the issue of cutting down of mature trees prior to or during construction of new developments. Work continues towards the community association being notified prior to this happening and for the Heritage Planner of The City of Calgary being involved when trees on the Heritage Tree Inventory are involved.



Spring Fling a Great Success

The third annual Spring Fling was held on April 11. It probably was the best one yet. There were lots of people interested in the history book as well as having a good time. The silent auction was very successful. Thank you to the businesses who donated items. At the time of writing, the net funds raised directly from the event to go towards the history book were just under \$2200. In addition, presales of the history book and donations were a little under \$2000. In addition Servus Credit Union with whom we do our banking is providing a grant of \$1000. This totals over \$5000, a very good start towards publishing the book. Thank you to all who made this possible.

We are very busy working towards the publishing of our new history book entitled "Cliff Bungalow - Mission, A Heritage Community". Mission Possible 3



Corinne Ofstie on Finding a Meaningful Career

Corinne Ofstie is a homegrown Calgarian with a passion for making a difference in the lives of those around her. Her initial dream was to become a lawyer but she is more than happy with where she has ended up. Working for the non-profit Association of Alberta Sexual Assault Services (AASAS), Corinne is the Strategic Initiatives Coordinator. She oversees the provincial training program and is responsible for provincial data collection and outcome measurement to determine best practices for all the services offered.

Prior to the AASAS, Corinne was the Coordinator of the Calgary Domestic Violence Collective (CDVC), a United Way funded non-profit, coordinating collaboration in the domestic violence sector. She graduated with an Arts degree before getting her Bachelor of Social Work also at the University of Calgary. During her time with CDVC, Corinne was fortunate to find a great mentor and non-profit leader, Deb Tomlinson who helped Corinne find her position with Deb at AASAS.

During her time at AASAS, Corinne has learned a lot about the sector; more specifically the issues of sexual violence and rape culture. The misconceptions around it are just as troubling as how prevalent it is in our society. There are so many people affected by sexual violence, and only a portion ever report or seek help. This work is impactful. For Corinne, "it's not about if you will be impacted, but when you will be impacted by the work." She said she is inspired by the immense capacity for people to heal.

Working within the field of gendered violence, Corinne continues to build the values of feminism, equality and "respecting the other." Personally she has been fortunate enough to never have had her beliefs challenged, and she understands the conflicts within feminism. It is important to fight for equality in all situations, especially in terms of a person's safety and wellbeing.

The most challenging part of the job is minimizing and managing the effects of vicarious trauma which mean taking time for self-care. Offsetting the challenges, is the reward of having a meaningful impact through work. She loves "getting to see the amazing changes that are happening within the field that benefit people in need."

When you're not at work, what can you be found doing? I love spending the weekends with my husband and dog, Sam, about the neighborhood, bonding as a family and taking the time to relax.

What is the best career tip you've learned?

I have learned to know and understand my style, my learning style - which is to learn by doing. It has enabled me to better understand, engage and work with people who have different or similar learning styles. This has also contributed to my own degree of self-awareness and the selfevaluation of the effectiveness of my approach to projects both at work and in my personal life.

Another big thing I have learned in my young career that has benefitted me greatly is the importance of demonstrating leadership through my work and/or volunteer

What do you love most about Calgary and why?

It is hard to settle on just one thing that I love about Calgary. I love this town, I was born here; I love the people, the culture, the food, the shopping, inner city life and the community spirit. That's it...I would have to say the community spirit is what I love most about Calgary. In the 2013 flood the community where I live and volunteer for the community association, Cliff Bungalow-Mission, was one of the communities significantly impacted and I witnessed firsthand the power and strength of Calgary's community spirit. The way we all came together to help, to cry and to celebrate each other was truly inspiring.


Calgary's FCJ's Found Southern Alberta's first school

In the last article the Sisters McLaughlin, Twomey, and Higgins and their Superior, Mother Greene, had arrived safely in Calgary on July 25, 1885. Their new home, the Notre Dame de la Paix Mission, had been established 10 years earlier and boasted a church, a rectory, stables and surrounding residential subdivision which was registered by the Oblates. It was located just south of Notre Dame Avenue, the southern limits of the recently incorporated Town of Calgary, with a population estimated by a popular directory to be 1,000. And with the surrounding population served by the Mission being much higher, it was necessary to establish a school. The Sisters were assigned to that task and they were ready. Having survived their ordeal at St. Laurent, their courage and confidence was proven and strengthened for their next assignment. They had faced the tribulations they confronted during the rebellion with complete acceptance and pragmatism, dealing with the challenges that each new day brought. Any concerns they may have had were reserved solely for others.

The Sisters were given 23 town lots plus the Oblate Fathers' 1883 two-storey rectory and chapel (where the 1924 east wing of the convent is today) and a new rectory was built for the Fathers. They named their new 'convent' Sacred Heart after their mission house in St. Laurent. Building works were necessary to provide classrooms and dormitories for boarding students. When work began on the second floor, the Sisters moved to the stables. There they lived with minimal protection from the elements, sharing their cramped quarters with food storage - but their beautiful location had a garden with fresh Elbow River water running through it and a view of the Rockies we can only imagine today. And they soon returned to their newly renovated convent/ school.

On September 1st, the first day of classes, they opened Calgary's second school, the first being a log cabin established in 1884 which only lasted a year. 16 pupils attended that first day and 55 within a few months. It would soon become the first separate school in the territories. It was also the first francophone school in Southern Alberta. At the start students were mostly Métis and French speaking. There were both day students from Calgary and boarders from all over Southern Alberta.

Although their Order originated in France, all four Sisters were Irish-born. However, they were fluent in French and English and taught in both languages. They were also trained in other European languages, music and other cultural subjects and able to provide a good classical education. Their small number also managed to teach practical classes like textile crafts, instruct multiple classrooms (separate classes were required for girls and boys) and take charge of their boarders. The Sisters earned an excellent reputation and for several decades were synonymous with Calgary's Catholic education system. Their Superior, who and taught at the school and was its Principal in addition to heading the convent, was to become an important figure in Southern Alberta's history.

Mother Mary Greene (1843-1933) played a key role in establishing Southern Alberta's first Catholic education district and served as its first superintendent. She was also responsible for establishing high (and strict) educational standards and gaining government recognition for the school. Greene was born in the Irish county of Tipperary in 1843, the year after Marie Madeleine had established the first FCJ (Faithful Companions of Jesus) houses in Ireland. She was educated in an FCJ convent school and later in life became head of that same convent. Following her arrival in Calgary, she obtained her



teaching certificate in 1886 and her degree from the University of Ottawa in 1890. Widely recognized for her confidence and determination, she forged critical relationships in her dealings with government, church officials and school board trustees. One such relationship was with her 'great friend and advisor' Chief Justice Charles-Borromée Rouleau, a prominent Mission resident and member of the Territorial Council and the Territorial Assembly. Together with Rouleau, Mother Greene successfully lobbied the Territorial government to form a separate school district. In 1885 Lieutenant Governor Dewdney proclaimed the Lacombe (now the Calgary Roman Catholic) Separate School District Number 1 - the first in the Northwest Territories. In 1896 Mother Greene was promoted to Superior of the FCJ's in Canada.

The popular school grew rapidly with parents wanting their children to attend regardless of their faith or language. In 1886 the Sisters added two wings to their woodframe convent/school. By 1888 their school had grown to 90 pupils. When a third wing was added the following year, the FCJ's were able to offer both primary and secondary education - the first Catholic high school in Alberta. By 1893 the building was used solely for education and a more permanent and substantial building was erected for their convent and residences. The school's growth also saw a change in the demographic of the student population; it was becoming predominantly Anglophone. The changing demographic, accompanied by a series of ordinances adopted by the territorial government from 1888-96, effectively eliminated French in schools. The 1896 ordinances permitted the teaching of classes in French only if numbers allowed, and by 1899 the FCJ Sisters were teaching French exclusively as a second language. By 1905, when Alberta became a province there were no longer francophone schools in Calgary. On the other hand, Catholic schools were on an equal standing with their public counterparts.


From around 1906 there was a gradual movement to establish boys' instruction and recruit male teaching staff. The boys' classes moved to the basement of the newly constructed 1905 Parish Hall built the previous year (today's Alberta Ballet). By 1909 a new St. Mary's



1893 Sacred Heart Convent (extant) sandstone building with both French influences - mansard roof and gabled dormers - and Roman Catholic arched windows, possibly designed by Father McGuiness

School (non-extant, replaced by a replica building, Our Lady of Lourdes School) was built to accommodate both boys and girls from grades 1-12. In 1918, the Fathers' rectory was adapted as a senior boys' boarding school, St. Mary's College, and the 1909 school was renamed St. Mary's Girls' School. From that time forward only girls boarded at the convent. Mother Greene was in Australia during this period, having been assigned to act as the FCJ Superior for that continent in 1913 but she returned upon her retirement in 1922. In 1924 the convent was expanded with an east extension for the boarders and a Chapel to the south. The St. Mary's Boys' School was built in 1927 (present site of St. Monica's K-9 School) and, from the 1930's, Fathers from the Basilian Order took over the boys' instruction. In 1957 the girls' school underwent a major expansion and a new boys' high school was built east of the 1909 parish hall, the 1927 school becoming St. Mary's Elementary. But only a decade later, with declining enrolment, the girls' school became a coeducational high school and the Sisters joined with Basilian Fathers and lay teachers to form the new faculty. Interestingly, when French became an official language in 1969, bilingual instruction was reinstated by the Catholic school board.

During the latter part of the 20th century, having played a major role in the establishment of Southern Alberta's first separate and bilingual schools here in Mission, the FCJ's increasingly changed their focus from education to retreat and pastoral work. This is evident in today's FCJ Retreat and Conference Centre, the subject of the next and final part in this article.



It's Time to Open Calgary's Cycle Track **Network!**

Construction is nearly finished and soon we'll be launching Calgary's new Cycle Track Network! Please join me to celebrate this great step forward for Ward 8, and for our city. We'll have live music, food trucks, family-friendly activities and plenty of bicycle parking, so get on your bike and make your way to Barb Scott Park in the Beltline (9 St & 12 Ave SW) on Sunday, June 21, from 11am to 3pm.

The Cycle Track Network is a pilot project that builds on the existing regional pathway network and current track on 7 Street SW. The new bike lanes are protected by a physical barrier from moving cars, parked cars and sidewalks, thus providing a predictable space for cyclists, increasing safety, and making it easier to get around downtown Calgary on a bike. The network includes the following new cycling routes:

- 5th Street, from 3rd to 17th Avenues SW
- 12th Avenue, from 11th Street SW to 4th Street SE
- •8th & 9th Avenues, from 11th to 3rd Streets SW & from Macleod Trail to 4th Street SE

Calgary is a big city now, and we're only going to get bigger. It is therefore crucial that we provide more travel choices, especially for getting in and out of downtown, and that these options are safe, convenient, accessible and permanent. There are currently 11,000 cyclists who cycle in and out of downtown every day - this number will increase, and the new centre city routes are an excellent step in preparing for Calgary's bike-friendly future.

Let's demonstrate the value of this project, and give credit to the City staff and engaged citizens who made the Cycle Track Network a reality. I hope you'll join me on Sunday, June 21.
