## PRESIDENT'S REPORT

#### Origin of mystery benches is in Cliff Bungalow-Mission

On October 1<sup>st</sup> I received a phone call from Annalise Klingbeil of the Calgary Herald on whether CBMCA had anything to do with the benches that were springing up along 4<sup>th</sup> Street and elsewhere. I must admit at that very moment I did not know what she was talking about and asked her for some information. I confirmed the community association is not spearheading this project but would not be surprised that some our residents were involved. Since then I have figured out more of what is going on.

An article was published in the Calgary Herald on October 3<sup>rd</sup> featuring one of these benches in front of Kricket's and I realized I had already seen that bench in our beer garden at the Picnic on September 27. So the mystery was a little less for me. Then there was a follow up article in the Herald on October 4th partially unveiling who is behind these benches. Two of the people were identified by their initials, B.B. and K.Z. This really helped unveil the mystery for me as they brought the benches to the beer garden. There are one or two houses on one of our tree-lined residential streets (to remain unidentified) that are a bee hive of community minded people, good ones, the ones you want to have in your community. My lips are sealed on saying more but I do want to recognize and congratulate those people behind this wonderful project.





#### Update on two important planning matters

This is being written early in October and two important planning matters are still under active consideration.

The proposed land use redesignation in the 300 block of 25<sup>th</sup> Avenue SW went back to Council on September 8<sup>th</sup>. Council turned down Administration's recommendation to "...file and abandon Bylaws 15P2013 and 44D2013."The next step is to determine how to define and manage a "density bonus" that would be provided to this community by the developer. This type of thing occurs Downtown and in the Beltline but is new to our community.

The second item is the proposed sale of park land in the southwest corner of the community. This matter was to go to the Land Asset and Strategy Committee of Council on September 18 but that did not happen. The next potential date is October 16. This Committee works "in camera" (in private) but representatives of our community, the Mount Royal Community and the applicant made short presentations to that committee. At the time of writing we do not know the outcome. A recommendation one way or the other may have been made to Council (again in camera) or they may have directed some additional work be done and brought back to committee at a later date.

#### Great jazz right in your own backyard

At the time of writing we just wrapped up our regular monthly jazz night at the community hall. The group was the Jim Brenan Quartet, who did a tribute to Eddie Harris. The music was great. Jim also explained some of the subtleties of jazz music and how it has evolved. These jazz concerts are a short walk away from you home and the price is very affordable, only \$10 for CB-MCA members. These concerts are wonderful oppor-





For years when walking to and from downtown from my home in Mission, I have stumbled along the broken and warped asphalt path bordering Holy Cross Lane.

The path is well-used and the only route from the top of 1st Street over to 2nd Street and on to Memorial Park Library and the downtown core. And of no small importance, it offers a delightful walk along the river, worthwhile in itself and a desirable amenity to a community and a city that encourages pedestrian travel.

I am appreciative, and I now walk the Lane with a new spring in my step.

# The Faithful Companions of Jesus and the Sacred Heart Convent

## **Part I** Courageous and Confident, Calgary's FCJ Order

The FCJ Christian Life Centre at the beautiful and historic Sacred Heart Convent in Mission has a remarkable story. So remarkable in fact, that after visiting with the Sisters and their archivists. I realized it would take more than one article to do it justice. So I am writing their story in four parts. This first piece covers the establishment of their religious order in France, its courageous foundress, its growth and overseas expansion and the first journey to western Canada. Future articles will cover the adventures of the FCJ Sisters during the Riel Rebellion and trip to safety at the Notre Dame de la Paix Mission in Calgary, the establishment of Southern Alberta's first separate and bilingual schools by the FCJ's in Mission, and their Retreat and Conference Centre and lovely convent todav.

As one might guess, this story, which is part of *Rouleauville's* history, begins in France, in Amiens.

There, in 1820, Marie Madeleine de Bonnault d'Houet (1781-1858), nee Victoire, founded a religious order devoted to education, retreat and missionary work. She named it the Fideles Compagnes de Jésus (Faithful Companions of Jesus or FCJ) under the rule of Ignatius, which drew some opposition from the Jesuits. This was in addition to the numerous challenges entailed in founding and operating an order, but Mme. d'Houet, a single mother widowed in 1805, was never one to choose the easy path. Propelled forward by her faith, social conscience and generosity towards those less fortunate, she often used the expression "courage and confidence". One could also say "competence" owing to her strong administrative and management abilities. Following the first FCJ house in Amiens which still stands today, her order grew to over 300 by 1823, and expanded rapidly to other locations in France. By 1831 Marie Madeleine had expanded to England and by 1842, to Ireland; she oversaw the high level operation of all the houses she founded. She characteristically endured personal hardship to accomplish her task, making over 500 journeys - some by barge, cart and ferry and 60 by sea.

At the time of her death in 1858 Marie Madeleine had founded 17 houses and her successor Mother Josephine Petit, who was elected as the second superior general, would go on to open a further 17 and also expand into missionary territories in Canada and Australia. Mother Petit had accompanied Mme. Houet on a crucial journey to Rome in 1837 where Pope Gregory XVI had met with them and granted their society approval. In 1882, she

received a letter from Vital Grandin. the Bishop of St. Albert (Alberta), at her FCJ house in St. Anne d'Auray, Morbihan (which also stands today). The Bishop invited her to send 3 or 4 Sisters to establish boarding schools in the Canadian Northwest Territories, painting a very clear picture of the physical, mental and financial hardships they would be facing. Mother Josephine's response showed the society was fully aware of the sacrifices required, and fully prepared to make them. In fact, when the mission to Canada was being considered, of 800 FCJ members, 600 had volunteered!

One year later, seven Sisters - mostly English and Irish - embarked upon their intrepid journey to the Northwest Territories with their superior, Mother Mary Greene. Mother Mary was born in County Tipperary and head of the convent school there, although her vows were taken in Paris. She had met Bishop Grandin in Ireland in 1880 and understood the need for Catholic schools and educators in the Territories. The first leg of their journey was a voyage on the S.S. Peruvian which left Liverpool May 10th, 1883 and arrived 11 days later in Quebec. From there they traveled by train to Qu'Appelle Saskatchewan, accompanied by Bishop Grandin, In 1851 Frenchborn Grandin had joined the Oblates of Mary Immaculate (OMI), an order established in the south of France in 1816, just a few years before Marie Madeleine founded her order. In 1854 he had been ordained (by the OMI founder himself) and immigrated to Canada. During a small station stop enroute to Qu'Appelle, the Bishop spoke to the Sisters about the important connections between their two

orders: "the spirit of poverty and humility has presided over all your foundations ... your Society was founded at the same time as ours, and approved of by the same Pope". He told them "I think that you are destined for the Missions".

On June 11, the day after they reached Qu'Appelle, having already been traveling for a month, they began the most difficult part of their journey, a trek across the prairies by covered wagons accompanied by the Bishop, priests and Métis aids. Camping in the wild in torrential

rainstorms, traversing muddy terrain and rough roads, fording flooded coulees on foot, and beating off swarms of mosquitoes - so insufferable that even the horses went missing for a day to escape them - were just some of the challenges they encountered enroute. Having endured all these difficulties with grace and good spirit, the Sisters finally reached St. Laurent (near today's Batoche, Saskatchewan) on June 28, where a modest timberframe chapel and mission house awaited them. Mother Greene and Sisters Higgins, McLaughlin and

Twomey remained to found their mission school while the other four Sisters traveled an additional forty miles to Prince Albert. When the Bishop left the Sisters on July 3, his parting message to them, a gospel reading "Behold I send you as sheep amongst wolves", was prophetic. Two years later the Sisters found themselves in the midst of the Riel Rebellion, and the St. Laurent and St. Albert missions would turn out to be a temporary stop on their roundabout route to founding their convent and school here in our neighbourhood in Calgary.

# Elbow River Pedestrian Bridges Replacement Project Update

#### Steel tower, cables and deck panel installation underway


Work is progressing quickly on the project to replace the pedestrian bridges on the Elbow River damaged in the flood of 2013. Towers, cables and bridge decks are installed at Sandy Beach and Rideau Park Bridge and this work is underway at Riverdale Avenue Bridge. The project is still on track to have all of the bridges open and ready for use before the end of December.

There are three great time lapse sequences of the piling for the bridge foundations and the installation of the towers and deck panels at Sandy Beach Bridge located at www.calgary.ca/elbowbridges.

#### Completion work

Although it will look like the bridges are done when the deck panels go in, there is still work to do before the bridges can be safely opened for use. This includes adjusting the deck panels, fabricating and installing bridge railings, constructing concrete back walls and approach slabs and reconstructing pathways that lead up to each bridge. There is also landscaping and general finishing work to be done.

The areas around all three bridges are construction zones and will remain so until the bridges are open for use. The public must stay out of these areas for safety reasons.





#### **Animal & Bylaw Services**

#### Addressing the Problem...

Often times, when members of Animal & Bylaw Services or Alberta Health Services/Emergency Medical Services respond to a call, time is of the essence.

When accessing a property from an alley, the difficulty comes when addresses are not clearly displayed at the back of the home. It is even more difficult in areas where houses are built in close proximity to one another.

For your safety, please be aware that under the Community Standards Bylaw, your address must be clearly displayed at the back of your property, if adjacent to an alley or public walkway.

Calgary Fire, CPS and Animal & Bylaw Services appreciate your support and assistance.

#### **Be Street Smart Safe**

Do you know the rules of the road? Some people might be surprised by what bylaws exist in Calgary to ensure our streets are safe.

#### Recreation

Hockey nets, ski/snowboard/skateboard ramps and basketball nets are not permitted on City streets, even temporarily.

#### Obstruction

- Do not place electrical cords, hoses or chains over a sidewalk.
- Do not place any material in lanes, streets, sidewalks or City right-of-ways.

#### Vehicles

- Vehicles parked on driveways may not block sidewalks or boulevards
- Do not leave unregistered, uninsured vehicles on City streets or lanes.\*
- A vehicle must be operable and moved within 72, hours or it may be considered abandoned and removed as such.\*

\*This regulation is a part of Alberta's Traffic Safety Act and is enforced by the Calgary Parking Authority.



For Janet Jackson (I'm pretty sure she's heard all the jokes), who owns a century house on 22 Avenue between Fourth and Fifth, a front yard is a place to experiment. Her garden is a glorious hodgepodge of perennials, annuals, and even a plastic tree peeking out from behind some truly enormous hollyhocks. It is the anti-English garden.

"I'm a horticulturist," she says, "why would I want to come home to a highmaintenance garden?"

Although Janet faced skepticism from her husband when she turfed the lawn in 2001, Janet is adamant about her plethora of perennials. "This [garden] is for me," she says. And that garden will be forever changing. "I love trying different things and pushing zones."

Sandra and Jordan Hasselmann, on 23 Avenue between Fourth and Fifth, always hated their front lawn. Patchy and full of weeds, "the lawn

was horrid," says Sandra. Then a sewer line cracked and that lawn had to come out. It was a blessing in disguise.

In place of the lawn, the Hasselmanns worked with a horticulturist to install three raised vegetable beds surrounded by neatly spaced perennials with a bark mulch. The perennials are primarily ornamental grasses and ground covers such as vinca vines. They did decide on something traditional to a front yard – a hedge – but put their own spin on it. "We went with willows," says Sandra. The visual juxtaposition of the willow hedge, which moves sinuously in a breeze, and the linear-ness of the starkly rectangular vegetable beds is quite interesting.

Sandra's only issue to date? "Squirrels like this garden."

Cheryl and Jim Peacock moved to Cliff Bungalow (22 Avenue between Fourth and Cliff Street) from Mount Royal in August and one of the first things they did was rip out the lawn. A work in progress, they have worked with a horticulturist to install a dry streambed of river stones amid a garden of large perennials, such as peonies. Notable about this garden is the aluminum art piece placed gracefully to the right of the streambed. Cheryl is the artist.

Next up is a patio of Roman-style paving stones.

#### **Yielding to emergency vehicles**

Time is the enemy in any emergency. You can help EMS, police and fire get to the scene quickly and safely by following the rules of the road. It is important for motorists to understand how to safely yield right of way to emergency vehicles with lights and siren activated, so that everyone stays safe.

#### What to do when an emergency vehicle approaches with lights and siren activated

- If you're in the middle of an intersection when an emergency vehicle approaches with lights and siren activated, safely clear the intersection.
- On a one or two lane road, motorists should move to the right side of the road, slow down, and then stop. Remember to signal.
- On a road with three or more lanes, motorists should move to the nearest side of the road and stop. If driving in the centre lane, move to the right side of the road and stop. Remember to signal.
- Come to a complete stop and wait for the emergency vehicle to pass. Shoulder check for more emergency vehicles (there is often more than one) before re-entering traffic flow. Remember to signal.
- Remember, emergency vehicles may need to use any available road space to maneuver. This may include the use of shoulders and left hand turning lanes to pass other traffic.

#### While driving on the road

- Drive attentively and defensively at all times. Be cognizant to sirens of emergency vehicles and be prepared to vield the right of way.
- It is the law for motorists to slow down to at least 60 km/hour (unless a lower speed is posted) when driving past an emergency vehicle which is stopped.
- Do not break the rules of the road in order to give right of way to an emergency vehicle. This could include proceeding through a red light or making an illegal turn. Actions such as these jeopardize all motorists in the area.
- Driver attention must be directed towards the roadway and safe operation of the vehicle in which they are driving, at all times.
- Always leave plenty of space between your vehicle and an emergency vehicle should it need to stop suddenly.

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# CALGARY WILDLIFE

The Long-Eared Owl (Asio otus) gets its name from the very long feather tufts that stick up like ears close to the middle / top of its head. An unusual position compared to other "eared" owls (like the Great Horned Owl or Short-Eared Owl). These owls are well camouflaged, secretive and not easily seen. The upper portion of the body is dark brown with speckles of white on the back of the head, and black/brown steaks on a pale background on its neck and chest. It has a reddish brown to orange tone facial disc with narrow black markings framing its orange eyes. It is a medium sized owl, 35 cm long, with a wing span of 252-319 mm. Females are larger than males.

The Long-Eared Owl lives throughout central and southern Alberta. It can be found at sea level and altitudes up to about 2750 meters, and has a stable population, which usually over winters except at its northern most range. Though it is common, it is still hard to find one, or even a mating pair in the wild.

This owl spends its days roosting, well hidden in dense trees, usually sitting very still, near the trunk where their colouring hides their presence. They are not active during the day, so that even those that migrate do so under cover of the dark of night. During the breeding season their need for an abundant food supply (of mice, voles, gophers, young hare and rabbits, and even small birds) results in their numbers being low in any one area, and some of these birds are even nomadic in response to the available food supply.

Like other owls, the Long-Eared Owl is adapted for silent flight and precision hunting. Flight feathers with forward fringed edges and downy surfaces quiet the sound of the owl's passage through air. They hide in the trees during the day, but in the dark of the night they hunt over open grasslands, making low long passes over their hunting territory. The Long-Eared Owl's hearing is so sharp that at night they can catch their prey in complete darkness and silence, so you're not likely to see or hear them out hunting.

## Secretive and hard to find

How do you spot this elusive bird? Look for evidence of their nest and roosting sites in woodlands, forest edges, and patches of trees where dense cover is present for nesting and open areas are nearby for hunting. They'll roost in wooded ravines, gullies, treed strips along rivers, conifer stands, windbreaks, shelterbelts, and woodlots. With owls you can always look on the ground for pellets (gray, oval rolls of regurgitated fur, feathers, and bone). If you find a large number of these, you may be under a roost tree. Long-Eared Owl pellets are about 2-3" long, while pellets of other owls are either larger and less elongated, or smaller and rounder. The most likely time you'll have a chance to see these owls in the wild, is during the colder months when they roost in large groups (as many as 80 or more). It seems that these groups come together year after year and use the same roosting sites, which is a very unusual habit for an owl.

If you find an injured or orphaned Long-Eared Owl, or other wild bird or animal, please contact the Calgary Wildlife Rehabilitation Society for further instructions.

#### **Community Update On New Schools**

The Calgary Board of Education is pleased to welcome more than 3,000 additional students this year. With rapid growth comes the challenge of finding schools for all these students. Funding for new school construction hasn't kept pace with growth, particularly in new communities. As a result, we bus about a third of our students to schools where there is space.

To meet this pressing need, the CBE is planning the construction of 12 new schools, three major modernizations and two replacement schools, all to open in 2016.

New K- Grade 4 schools for Panorama Hills, Tuscany, Auburn Bay, New Brighton, Copperfield, and Evanston.

New Grades 5 – 9 schools for New Brighton–Copperfield, Evergreen, Mackenzie Towne, Saddle Ridge, Rocky Ridge–Royal Oak.

Modernization of Bowness High School and Jack James High School, and turning the former Harold W. Riley school into an Aboriginal learning centre.

Replacement of Christine Meikle and Elbow Park schools.

The Province is also building a new northeast high school to open in 2016.

In addition, the Province announced Sept. 22 that it would partner with the CBE to build four starter schools. They will be built in phases to get students into classes before the entire school is complete. It also announced funding for modular classrooms for Westgate School and for the planning of a new south Calgary high school.

Funding for new schools, modernizations and modulars comes from the province and the CBE is very grateful to the government for this investment in education.



#### Coming soon! Action Plan 2015-2018

On November 4, The City of Calgary will release its next four-year strategic plan and budget for public review. As part of The City's regular cycle of municipal elections and business planning, Action Plan is how we connect our City's day-to-day operations with its long-term goals, as well as balance providing great services with affordable tax rates for all Calgarians.

The Action Plan process launched last March with a broad-reaching citizen engagement campaign. Informed by engagement results, as well as other inputs like major economic and demographic trends, City finances and legislative obligations, Calgary City Council drafted and approved its Priorities for 2015 - 2018 in May.

Over the summer, City staff created plans and budgets in response to Council's Priorities within spending limits identified by Council. The result, Action Plan 2015 - 2018, identifies how The City will deliver 44 of Council's strategic actions over four years, representing over \$20 billion of capital infrastructure investment and service delivery. We will also continue to provide nearly 100 different kinds of front-line services that support citizens in their daily lives.

Visit calgary.ca/actionplan to see the full plan on November 4, as well as City performance measures, benchmarking, citizen engagement, budgets and detailed Council Priorities. After Action Plan is released, Council will consider the plan for approval during two weeks of deliberations from November 24 to December 5, 2014.

Find out more and get involved! From November 4 onward, citizens can comment on the proposed plan on calgary.ca, by filling out a comment card at your local public library, or by contacting 311. As well, citizens are invited to sign-up before November 19 to speak during Council deliberations or submit a presentation in advance for consideration by November 13. All feedback will be shared with Council.


