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

Calgary River Valleys (CRV) conducted the first count of Brown Trout Redds in the Elbow River since two major projects in the river in 2019, the Government of Alberta's Spawning Habitat Restoration and the City of Calgary's Elbow Island Gravel Bar Re-Shaping & Fish Compensation project. The identification of the need for these projects was determined in part by the historical redd count data conducted and provided by CRV. CRV is a not-for-profit organization led by volunteers dedicated to building a strong and effective voice for river valleys protection and water quality in Calgary.

This November members of CRV were joined by fish biologists, hydrology experts, high school students and members of the public to once again survey the Elbow River for Brown Trout spawning activity in two counts, one below the Glenmore Dam to Fort Calgary, as well as a second survey where the Elbow River crosses from Rocky View County into the western edge of Calgary. In the Lower Elbow, the participants had the opportunity to observe the effects of the gravel replenishing that occurred in several sites below the dam and at Sandy Beach Park. They also had the chance to walk the newly re-opened side channel on the south side of Elbow Island that had been blocked in the 2013 flood and was no longer available for spawning activity, until it was restored this year.

The Elbow River has historically played a significant role in the success of the Elbow and Bow River fisheries by providing spawning habitat to Rainbow and

# Calgary River Valleys Observes Impact from Two Trout Spawning Remediation Projects

Brown Trout. These fisheries provide a significant economic benefit to the City and Province through travel, fishing licences, and gear purchasing.

The Elbow River lacks suitable small spawning gravels in multiple locations as the river bottom is predominantly large rocks and bedrock, especially since the 2013 flood. Calgary River Valleys had identified a decline in the number of Brown Trout Redds following the 2013 flood, and noted a down-river shift of Redds, as the preferred spawning gravel had been pushed downstream by the swiftly moving water. The purpose of the City's and Province's projects were to restore spawning habitat by adding appropriately sized gravels in particular locations below the Glenmore Dam and near Sandy Beach Park, and to restore the spawning channel at Elbow Island.

Success of the projects will be measured in part by Calgary River Valleys' volunteers through annual Redd Counts. The City has agreed to monitor and maintain the work completed this year to assess the success of these projects through:

- Riverbank stabilization;
- Monitoring gravel movement along the Elbow River downstream of Glenmore Dam; and
- Potential future gravel replenishment events to maintain Elbow River spawning habitat.

# Don't Let the Grinch (Thieves) Steal Christmas

A message from the Federation of Calgary Communities Special thanks to the Calgary Police Service Crime Prevention Unit for their input.

The Christmas season is prime time for car prowlers and thieves. Here are a few tips to help reduce your risk:

- When you exit or enter your parked vehicle, stop and look around the area
- Before leaving your parked car, always remove the keys, roll up the windows and lock the doors
- Park in a well-lit area, use parking lots frequented by others and avoid parking behind fences or hedges
- Put all valuables and gifts in your trunk. If that's not possible, conceal gifts and other valuables

- Try not to unload gifts in your vehicle and then leave it unattended in the same parking spot. Car prowlers might be on the lookout for shoppers traveling back and forth from stores to unload gifts
- · Never leave your car running unattended
- If you park in an attached garage, always lock the door leading from the house to the garage and the garage door
- If you don't park in a secure garage at home, don't leave gifts in cars overnight
- If your car is stored in a carport or parked near your house, leave your exterior lights on throughout the night
- · If you park on the street, choose a well-lit, open space
- Consider replacing the light fixture closest to your car with a motion detector unit. Motion detectors are good psychological deterrents
- After opening an automatic gate to underground parking, wait for the gate to close before you park. Watch out for thieves waiting to slip in behind you
- Avoid parking in attended lots. They're a major source of copied keys which can be used later to steal your vehicle and valuables.

Prevent crime by reporting suspicious behaviour to police at 403-266-1234. Call 911 for a crime in progress.



# **Historic City Hall**

700 MacLend Trail SF by Jocelyn Taylor

For the December installment of #InstagrammingHistory, we're going to take a look at Historic City Hall. Now, I know that the building itself is under construction and is completely unviewable at the moment; however, it's cold, and with the hustle and bustle of the holiday season, I figured that providing a place that could be visited down the road (when the construction is completed. perhaps?) could be helpful! The building was formally completed in 1911, so when the restoration project was approved in 2014, it was clear that the building was in need of some much-deserved TLC.

Designed by architect William Dodd, Historic City Hall is considered to Alberta's primary example of the Romanesque Revival architectural style, and is the only surviving building of its kind in western Canada. Construction on the four-storey sandstone building began in 1907, but controversy ensued when the budget to complete the building became more that double the initial estimated cost of \$142,000 (this sounds like a throwback version of the Peace Bridge drama, right?). The large sandstone building has a tall, centred clocktower, which has become the focal point of the structure. Calgary's

original Town Hall was built in 1885 and was demolished in 1911, once the new building was complete.

The building used to be multi-purpose, as the head office for the Calgary Police Department was housed in Historic City Hall until 1914. Conveniently, there were also 15 jail cells on the main floor, and the courtroom was in the same building, on the same floor. Such efficiency! As Calgary continued to grow, additional space was needed, and the Calgary Municipal Building was constructed in 1985. Despite the new space, the mayor, city clerk, and councillors keep their offices within Historic City Hall.

Over the years, Historic City Hall has hosted some royal guests. King George VI and Queen Elizabeth stopped by in May of 1939 during their Royal Tour. The building did not have a red carpet, so a roll was borrowed from St. Augustine's Church and was sprawled across the steps of City Hall, extending to the curb. The then Princess Elizabeth and the Duke of Edinburgh also visited the building on October 18, 1951, and were greeted by thousands of onlookers who gathered outside the hall, despite the less-than-stellar Calgary weather.

In 2014, City Council approved a plan to rehabilitate the building, which included a 34.1-million-dollar investment. Currently, the building is completely hidden by scaffolding; however, it is expected to be removed in 2020. Since the building is provincially, federally, and municipally protected and recognized, the rehabilitation had to be completed in a way that protects the heritage of the building. This includes sandstone and concrete renewal, a new drainage system, structural rehabilitation of verandas and balconies, retreatment of the sandstone, and more. When the building is revealed, the new sandstone will likely look different than the old, as it has not been given time to weather; however, after several years, the building will look uniform again.

With Historic City Hall getting this little makeover, hopefully you'll be able to head out and admire the changes and work that went into keeping this building up and running. City Hall is an iconic part of the downtown core, and I know I have missed seeing the sandstone structure while driving downtown. The 2020 reveal can't come fast enough!

About the Backstory: In 1914, three brothers—Emidio, Isidoro and Antonio Santarelli—established a prosperous vino and olii (wine and oil) business in Rome, Italy; operating 11 re-

tail outlets throughout The Eternal City. In 1955, a next generation—Emidio's son Dino—expanded operations, exporting Azzuri wines to the Italian ex-pat community in Canada.

**About the Vision:** Trebbiano and Malvasia, the traditional wines of the region of Lazio, were historically produced for prompt consumption in the tourist cafés of Rome. Made to less-than-world standards, they suffered issues of both reputation and potential. In 1967, a third generation of Santarellis—Dino's son Antonio—focused on raising the bar, and working alongside Trentino Oenologist, Paolo Tiefenthaler (in collaboration with distinguished research institutions) began experimenting with grape varietals and best practices gleaned the world over. It was then Padre and Figlio Santarelli formed Casale Del Giglio, judiciously converting property in the Agro-Pontino Valley (50 km south of Rome) into a world-class vineyard and winemaking operation.

**About Terroir:** Situated on the left, midway up the boot near the archeological city of Satricum, rich soils of red clay and mountain alluvium provide fertile vine terra. Gentle breezes from the Tyrrhenian Sea offer moderation and coveted daily temperature diurnals to Lazio's Warm Mediterranean environs.

**About the Grape:** Indigenous to the region, Cesanese is a small berried, low-yield red grape requiring extended hang time (late October harvest). Known in various dia-

lects as Bambino, Senero, Sancinera, and Mangiatora, it is vintage volatile and well suited to Lazio's warm environs.

**About the Wine:** Blackish purple in-glass, the nose suggests notes of mint, violet and Italian plum. Given the wine's inky appearance, the mouth is lighter than anticipated; with refreshing flavours of mint, slightly under-ripe blackberry, and dark cherry. The tannins are pleasing, and the finish is long.

**About Pairing**: Osso bucco, rabbit/beef stew, sausage ravioli, cassoulet (meat or veggie)

#### **Recycle Right: Safety Edition**

Many things just don't belong in the blue bin.

Not only are they not blue bin recyclable, but they can cause serious safety risks for your collector, staff and equipment at the recycling facility.

There have been several major fires at the recycling sorting facility this year because of people putting dangerous items in their blue carts that they shouldn't. Doing this endangers lives and forces the temporary closure of the facility. Think before you put something that is potentially explosive and deadly into a recycling bin.

Keep these types of items out of the blue bin:

BATTERIES are the #1 cause of fires at the recycling facility. This includes batteries from laptops, cameras and AA batteries. They are filled with chemicals that when crushed or when they get wet, can easily catch fire.

Recycle batteries the right way: Take your old batteries to a participating retailer for safe recycling - find a list of locations at call2recycle.ca/locator.

PROPANE, BUTANE AND HELIUM TANKS cause explosions, fires and jam up the equipment.

Dispose of propane, butane and helium tanks the right way: Take your old tanks (full or empty) to a City household hazardous waste drop-off near you - find a list of locations at calgary.ca/hhw.

JERRY CANS contain residual fuel, even if they are empty. Even just the fumes can result in an explosion or fire.

Dispose of Jerry cans the right way: Take your old jerry cans (full or empty) to a City household hazardous waste drop-off near you - find a list of locations at calgary.ca/ hhw.


