

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Casino Net Proceeds Received

We have received the net proceeds from our June 15 and 16 casino. The amount received was \$67,612.62. This is down from the \$74,190,24 received from our August 2014 casino. There has been downward trend this year which appears to be the result of the economic downturn.

The proceeds from all casinos held during a guarter are pooled and each group having a casino during that quarter receive an equal share. There are two parts to this pooling. One part is the proceeds from the tables at all casinos in Calgary which is the part our volunteers help mange during our two-day event. The second part is the proceeds from all casino lottery terminals in Alberta.

We thank everyone who volunteered for our casino. This is the biggest fundraiser available to us. Our next casino will be during the first quarter of 2018.

CBMCA Board Update

Spencer Perry, our Communications Director, will be stepping down at our Annual General Meeting being held on November 23rd. He is moving to Vancouver to a new job. We want to thank Spencer for his contributions to this community and wish him all the best in his new job.

So this means we need to recruit a replacement for Spencer. The key components of this position are:





Tips for a Green Thanksgiving

Thanksgiving is a great opportunity to have family and friends over for a meal to celebrate all the reasons we have to be grateful. Our beautiful planet gives us most of the essentials we need like water, food and materials for the things we use. Here are 6 ways you can show gratitude to our planet this Thanksgiving!

Avoid disposable plates & cutlery: even if it's a big crowd, use reusable cutlery, plates and serving dishes that you can wash and reuse again. Disposable plastic cutlery and paper plates take energy to produce & ship and end up in our landfills after just one use. If you have guests contributing to dinner with a dish of food, there's no trouble to having them bring a plate and utensils if you're running short. And asks guests to bring to-go containers for all the leftovers and send them home with the extras!

Get creative with the decor: Thanksgiving is the perfect holiday to go outside and gather up natural decorations. If you have children in your dinner party encourage them to make some decorative crafts with leaves, sticks and dried flowers from outside. Use candles made from soy or vegetable wax. Soy wax is clean-burning, without soot or harmful emissions, and has a low melting point so it burns at a cooler temperature.

Buy local food & drink: Buying local means that there's less energy in transporting your food to your market. It's harvest time, and there's plenty of farmer's markets and local produce available in your favourite grocery store.


Shop Organic: There's no doubt that organic agriculture is better for the landscape — fewer pesticides and other toxic chemicals seeping into soil and running off into rivers and lakes. Try to go organic from start to finish — and don't forget to include organic wines and other beverages on your menu!

Enjoy the trip: Ask your guests to walk, bike or use transit to get to your meal. Provide a space for bikes (covered or secure storage like your garage) or provide links for the quickest transit lines that go by your house. If driving is the only option, see if you can arrange for some of your guests to carpool, and be sure to check your air filter and make sure your tires are fully inflated; you'll reduce your carbon emissions and get better gas mileage. If you have family coming from out of town ask them to consider offsetting the carbon emissions of their holiday travel. The David Suzuki Foundation and the Pembina Institute have prepared a Purchasing Carbon Offsets guide to help you assess the quality of carbon offsets and the vendors that sell them.

Compost your organics: When you're all done eating, you don't have to throw out everything you couldn't get down. Compost your vegetables and fruit into your composter. Your garden will thank you!

Halloween Safety

The members of Calgary's Halloween *Partners for Safety:* Calgary's Child Magazine, EMS, Calgary Police, Fire, 9-1-1, Bylaw, Transit, and Shaw Communications would like to remind parents and trick-or-treaters of some Halloween safety tips, as October 31st approaches. *Partners for Safety* vehicles will be out patrolling communities on Halloween night to provide a visible safety resource for parents and trick-or-treaters.

Trick-or-Treaters

- Remember: all regular pedestrian rules still apply. Be sure
 to cross the road at marked crosswalks, or well-lit corners
 only. It is safest to work your way up one side of the street,
 and then cross once to the other side.
- Stay away from houses that are not well lit. Do not accept rides from strangers, or enter any home you feel is unsafe.
- Let your parents know where you are going to be at all times (route) and advise them if you will be late returning.

Costumes

- All costume accessories, such as sticks, rods, or wands, should be soft and flexible, with no sharp edges.
- Consider using hypoallergenic make-up kits instead of masks that may impair breathing, or vision.
- Be sure costumes are loose enough to be worn over warm clothing, but not so long that they become a tripping hazard. Costumes should not be longer than your child's ankles.
- Ensure your child is wearing adequate foot wear that takes into consideration weather conditions and walking.
- Consider sending your children with a flashlight for additional safety and increased visibility.
- When purchasing, or making costumes, look for materials and accessories that are labeled flame-resistant.
- Choose bright colored costumes that are highly visible. Adding reflective tape to costumes further increases visibility.

Parents

- Be certain that young trick-or-treaters are accompanied by an adult. Older children should stay in groups.
- Advise children not to eat anything until they return home. Dispose of any items that appear to have been tampered with, or that are not properly wrapped.
- Pre-determine boundaries to trick-or-treat within and establish a firm time to return home.

October Fire Prevention Week. October 9-15th

Your Calgary Fire Department wants you to make time to ensure that your family is safe from fires.

Don't wait, check the date!

If a fire occurs in your home, we, as firefighters know firsthand that only a WORKING smoke alarm can alert you. Smoke alarms that are older than 10 years old may not work when you need them most, so check the date on the unit, if it is older than 10 years old, replace it!

If there is no date, and it appears to be older than 10 years old, replace it.(even if it is hard wired)

Other simple reminders:

- check every detector monthly by pushing the test button
- change the battery annually (some now have ten year batteries)
- you need to be able to hear the beep when you sleep
- you should have a smoke alarm on every level of your home
- many smoke alarms will "chirp" when the battery is low or when the alarm has reached its lifespan

If the alarm does go off, your family can initiate your home escape plan. For additional information on escape plans, visit Calgary.ca/CSPS/Fire



GREEN YOUR HALLOWEEN

Halloween is a fun holiday for both parents and children – what's not to love about candy, costumes, and scary pumpkins? It's also a great opportunity for parents to teach their kids about the importance of making healthy, eco-friendly choices. Below are just a few small changes you can make that will help you and your family have a green, healthy, and happy Halloween.

Decorations: Avoid plastic decorations from the store. Look for recyclable and biodegradable products or show your kids how to make decorations using leaves, acorns, branches, and pumpkins or hanging string, sheets or cloths. Put strange things into jars, making crafts with scrap paper, and bringing out that houseplant you forgot to water. If you're lighting your scary ghost or front porch scarecrow, use fluorescent or LED light bulbs instead of incandescent. Google homemade Halloween decorations and costumes to find lots of inspirational ideas!

Use all of the pumpkin: Purchase one that's local, preferably from a nearby farmers' market rather than the grocery store. Their seeds are a great source of magnesium, iron, and protein; to prepare them, just rinse and flavour with your choice of spices, then bake in a 250 degree oven for an hour. The pulp can be steamed for half an hour, then served similarly to squash or used as a base for soups and pies.

Green your party: If you're having a party use re-usable cutlery, compost your food scraps and provide transit directions or carpooling suggestions to your quests.

Burn natural candles (if at all). Candles can give off toxic compounds. Choose fragrance-free candles made

from bees wax or soy to light up pumpkins or your party table.

Reuse or Borrow your Costume: Skip buying your costume this year by getting some friends together to do a costume swap. You could also check out a reuse store like Value Village, a consignment shop, or Kijiji. You'll probably find something even scarier (and cheaper!) than at the costume store.

Seek Out Non-Toxic Make-Up: Here's something spooky, in 2009 the Campaign for Safe Cosmetics tested 10 face paints for heavy metals and found that they all contained low levels of lead, and six had allergens like nickel, chromium, or cobalt. Scary, and not something you want to expose your children to., never mind covering their faces in these chemicals. If you're not sure what to look for when trying to identify colour additives or harmful chemicals in make-up kits go to this link http://www.safecosmetics.org for more info and to help you make an informed choice. The Environmental Working Group has done some of the research for you and has an extensive list of product suggestions on their website here: http://www.ewg.org/skindeep/browse/body+art/

Stock up on green candy: No need to give up sweets just to lessen your environmental footprint. Look for organic, local and/or fair trade products, which consider environmental impact, as well as economic and social criteria. You *could* ditch the candy altogether and consider giving out treasures or small gifts instead: kid themed band-aids, hair barrettes and elastics, painted acorns, second hand toy cars, felted decorations or other small (non-plastic) gifts are a nice change to candy (and parents will thank you!).

Swimming in the Lower Elbow River? Think Twice!

Wondering why Alberta Health Services issued a public health advisory this summer against swimming at Sandy Beach or Stanley Park?

A river running through the middle of a large city, its flows controlled by the Glenmore Dam, a receiving vessel of untreated stormwater from 85 storm sewers along its length, a home to wildlife, a million humans, and recreation for thousands of dogs and people; is there any wonder why the river might be unhealthy?

S2G+ welcomes the attention the AHS advisories have brought to the state of water quality in the Lower Elbow River. Fecal coliform bacteria, an indication of the presence of feces from warm-blooded animals including humans, are the most common microbiological contaminants found in untreated surface waters such as rivers, creeks and lakes. E. Coli is used as an indicator of contamination and dangerously high levels were measured in our river.

Elevated levels of E. Coli have been a recurring issue in the Lower Elbow River. In 2007, due to public health concerns, S2G+ and River Valleys Committee convinced the City of Calgary to add warning signs at Stanley Park and Sandy Beach because the City's "no wading and swimming" bylaw was not being enforced. The intent was to inform the public of water hazards including bacterial contamination, changing water levels and broken glass so that they could make an "informed" decision upon entering the water. Unfortunately, the signs were placed at the side of Sandy Beach and Stanley Park, out of easy sight of the recreating public

A number of new AHS/City advisory signs have now been erected at prominent spots along the length of the Lower Elbow River, warning waders and swimmers entering the water do so at their own risk. It is hoped, that resources will be employed to determine the source(s) of high level fecal contamination and to rectify the situation so that Calgarians might enjoy the Lower Elbow River without the worry of succumbing to serious "water recreational illnesses".

In the meantime, if you go swimming or wading in the Lower Elbow River, don't be fooled by what may look like clean, clear water:

- 1. Keep your head above water;
- 2. Don't drink the river water:
- 3. Don't let your children put fingers in their mouths while in or out of the water;
- 4. Sanitize your hands before eating food if you have been in the water; and
- 5. Have a hot soapy shower when you return home from recreating in the river.

Formed in 2004, S2G+ Preservation Society collaborates to enhance the environment and natural history of the lower Elbow River, its valley and contiguous benchlands from the Glenmore Dam to Fort Calgary. Listening is My Job

As Councillor for Ward 8, my first job is to listen. All of the other work I do; be it reading a report, sitting in a committee meeting, advocating in the media or speaking out for my ward in Council, is totally dependent on hearing your voices. The ways in which I stay connected are about as diverse as Ward 8 itself: Emails, phone calls, letters, newsletters, Facebook, Twitter, Instagram, and community associations are just a few. Of course, nothing beats meeting someone in person, looking them in the eye, and hearing what they have to say.

It's important that I continue this dialogue with you throughout my term in office. I want to hear your thoughts about our Ward 8 neighbourhoods and our growing city. Here are a few subjects to start off our conversation:

Green Cart Composting

Sustainable and thoughtful development is critical for our city's future. By this time next year, all single family homes in Calgary will be provided a Green Cart for composting. While composting might be new to some, the impact it can and will have on our landfills is really significant. Organic waste from Calgarians can be turned into compost can help our city in so many ways. It can go towards bettering our parks, helping small urban farming initiatives like The Alex's Community Food Centre or even offering options for renewable energy.

Affordable Housing

Not only must we accommodate the enormous pressures of growth that Calgary faces, but I believe that our greater community is only as good as it gives to those less fortunate. Therefore, affordable housing is a critical part of my work as Councillor. I'm proud that Council recently approved the Rosedale affordable housing project but that's a small step along a very long path. Some of the most important work we can do as citizens is increasing our capacity for empathy and understanding. Calgary currently has 56,000 people who are one paycheck or one rent increase away from housing instability. So, when you picture someone who is at risk of being homeless, the reality is that it could be someone much closer to you than you think.

Safety in the Inner City

Most of the communities in Ward 8 are within Calgary's inner city. So many of these neighbourhoods are growing and our services have kept up very well with the changes. Our infrastructure needs to adapt as well, and this is why I am pushing hard, for example, to upgrade the underpasses across the CP Rail tracks to make them safer, more convenient and more pedestrian-friendly. We've had some great successes as the 1st Street SW underpass is nearly complete and we've secured funding to start the renovation of the 4th Street SW underpass. We'll continue to work to make walking in the inner city safer and more enjoyable for all Calgarians.

I want to envision and build the future of our city together, and to do that I need to hear your voice. One Year In

Time sure flies. It has been one year since I was elected to be Calgary Centre's representative in our nation's capital. I had the pleasure of running on an aggressive platform for the middle class and we are well on the way to implementing the changes that we were elected to do. Let me give you an update on some of the projects that we've been working on as a government.

In Budget 2016 our government brought into force the newer, fairer, and tax-free Canada Child Benefit which will put approximately \$930 million into the pockets of Albertan families, and give Calgarians more money to save, invest, and grow the economy. Nine out of ten families will see more money and on the whole this policy change will raise some 300,000 children out of poverty.

As for our commitments to seniors – we moved the chains of justice forward by restoring the eligibility age for Old Age Security (OAS) and Guaranteed Income Supplement (GIS) to 65; and introduced a Seniors Price index to keep OAS and GIS at pace with the rising costs faced by seniors each year. Further to this we increased the Guaranteed Income Supplement for single, low income seniors by 10%, improving the financial security of about 900,000 single seniors across Canada.

Budget 2016 invests \$2.3 billion over two years to give Canadians greater access to more affordable housing. Our Government has already started to engage provinces and territories, Indigenous and other communities, and key stakeholders to develop a National Housing Strategy. This marks a return for the Government of Canada back to the table to play a leadership role in supporting affordable housing.

With regards to my portfolio of Veterans Affairs – my ministry is reopening the nine Veterans Affairs offices closed by the previous Conservative government, along with opening an extra one to continue our commitment to doing more for our veterans. This is in addition to increasing disability benefits, hiring hundreds more front line staff, and delivering on the care, compassion, and respect veterans and their families deserve.

Finally, the energy file this past year has been a focus of this new government with a combined effort by my cabinet colleagues. It is in this whole-of-government approach that we are reforming our regulatory framework, growing Canadians' trust in building energy projects, and working to getting our product to tidewater. By investing in indigenous communities, putting billions into the environment work we do at home and abroad, and improving the process, progress is being made.
