Bylaws Related To Snow & Ice


The City enforces bylaws related to snow and ice control on sidewalks. It is your responsibility to remove all snow and ice from sidewalks and pathways in front of or on the side of your property. Sidewalks and pathway surfaces should be bare and completely clear of snow and ice.

Snow Angels

Keeping sidewalks shoveled, ice-free and safe can be very challenging for older adults and other Calgarians who have limited mobility. Snow Angels is a campaign that encourages Calgarians to help neighbours in need with snow removal.

Safe snow shoveling techniques

- Space your hands on the shovel to increase leverage.
- · Stand with you feet apart, knees bent and back straight.
- Place your front foot close to the shovel.
- Put weight on your front foot. Step forward and use your legs to load a small amount of snow onto the shovel. Remember the wetter the snow, the heavier it
- Lift with your legs; do not bend at the waist.
- Keep the shovel close to your body.
- Walk to where you want to dump the snow. Turn your feet in the direction you are throwing the snow. Do not twist the waist.
- Pace yourself. Take appropriate rest breaks.
- Apply road salt/de-icer wherever necessary.

S2G+ Our Elbow River Forests

An autumn stroll through the golden aspen and poplars that line the lower Elbow River got me thinking about the fragility of native forests within our urban context. This fall spectacle, set off by vibrant red dogwoods, silvery buffalo berry, sparkling water, and a brilliant blue Alberta sky is something Calgarian's treasure.

Stands of trembling aspen, found in moist areas shelter birds, deer, hares, and meadow voles. Native to riverine ecosystems, Balsam Poplar forests, along with healthy underbrush and nearby wetlands and grasses provide critical habitat, especially for migratory and nesting birds. These trees span 80 to 100 years and are reliant on natural flooding and drying cycles in order to thrive. Because water levels are controlled by releases from the Glenmore Dam, lack of natural flooding except in extreme years is preventing the rejuvenation of the Balsam Poplar forests. Stands are gradually being replaced by conifers, other trees, and shrubs; many having "escaped" from area gardens.

Along our Elbow River park trails, Balsam Poplar forests are also at risk because of recreational use. For example, the establishment of the off-leash dog area at the end of Riverdale and along lower Britannia Slopes in the 1980's damaged the riparian area populated by this forest, leading to erosion of the river bank, and sediment deposits in the river that hinder brown trout spawning.

Remaining stands, whether on private or park land should be preserved by minimizing disturbance by humans and dogs. Active planting of new stands is encouraged. Park access should be limited to narrow designated trails.

Another threat to tree loss is beavers. Beavers are, at times, considered "problem wildlife" in parks due to their appetite for aspen and poplar tree bark. However beavers are integral to an ecosystem and efforts can be made to co-exist. You may have noticed wire wraps around the base of the trunks of many trees along the Elbow. These cylindrical "cages" should be high enough to prevent the beaver from felling the tree (up to 1.25 meters) taking into account the depth of the snow in winter. The wire cages should be anchored to the ground and allow a minimum 15 cm between the cage and trunk to avoid strangling the tree. Some of the beaver cages along the lower Elbow need replacing and additional cages should be installed. Contact S2G+ if you would like to volunteer for a beaver cage event.


Hi Judith.



There were moments of nail biting before September 19, as the books did not get delivered to us until the day before. Elbow River Pedestrian Bridges

finishing touches complete
Three pedestrian bridges in the neighbourhoods of

Rideau/Roxboro, Elbow Park and Britannia, were damaged beyond repair in the flood of 2013. After the flood, residents and other Calgarians said they wanted their bridges back as guickly as possible. The City delivered on that, re-opening the bridges just 18 months after the flood, ahead of schedule in November 2014.

Landscaping was completed in the spring and summer of 2015. During September, the final finishing touches - the panels commemorating the old bridges at each bridge entrance – were installed.

When the bridges opened to the public in November of 2014, the commemorative panels were not ready, so temporary panels were installed. Now that the landscaping is done and the final panels have been put in place, the project is truly complete.

Calgarians can expect the new bridges to last for at least 100 years, with special features to help them withstand any damage from future floods. For example, the bridge decks are higher than the old bridges, which allows a greater volume of water to flow underneath; the concrete bridge decks are able to withstand debris impacts; and the bridge supports are armoured with rock. In general, the bridges are much more durable because they are built to today's engineering standards, which were much different when the first bridge was built in 1934.




Reconstructing 17 Avenue South -**Project Update**

After 30 years of serving Calgary's uptown area, The City of Calgary is reconstructing 17 Avenue S., between Macleod Trail S.E. and 14 Street S.W. It's an investment in the longterm success of the street - one of Calgary's most popular destinations to meet friends, shop, visit and do business.

With the street reaching the end of its lifecycle in this area, 17 Avenue S. needs to be reconstructed from "dirt to pavement". The reconstruction involves underground utility work, building a new foundation for 17 Avenue S. and then paving and marking the surface.

In October, The City hosted three information sessions that provided an overview of the project and an update on the design progress including the recommendations from the Road Safety Review. If you weren't able to make it, you can see the latest information at www.calgary.ca/17avenue. The next project update will be available in early 2016, when we'll talk about construction staging and how we'll manage people travelling through the area during construction. At the end of November, City Council will release a productivity report that will discuss the successes of the first year of Calgary's Action Plan 2015–2018. The Action Plan outlines how we are able to implement our long term priorities and goals into everyday actions, as well as how we will continue to provide a diverse and superior set of services while maintaining affordable tax rates for all Calgarians.

The Action Plan considers two key sections of our bud-

Operating Budget: the funding gained through tax dollars and user fees that go towards providing fundamental services to everyone in the City.

Capital Budget: government grants, reserves, and new borrowing that is invested into infrastructure and city capital.

With the changes in the operating budget released in September, Council will be focusing on the Capital Budget. Here the finances of all projects that will commence or continue in 2016–2018 will be evaluated.

Cliff Bungalow - Mission Community


aste is a small space that packs a big punch in food, service and design. The menu focuses on regional, seasonal, chef-driven small plates and a creative business lunch during the week, as well as a delicious and boozy weekend brunch. The cozy 1st SW restaurant opened in 2009 as the recent addition to Hotel Arts. The space is modern and comfortable highlighted by polished concrete floors, barn board wall, iron I beams, custom filament lighting and open kitchen.


The original operating partner, Brendan Bankowski, moved on at the end of 2014 to open The Beltliner - a bustling modern diner a block away. Bankowski's wife, Erin Maguire, took over operations at Taste at that time, putting her 17 years of experience in the restaurant industry to good use in the space. One of the first things Maguire implemented at Taste was reservations.

Previously walk-in only, you can now reserve your spot online or on the phone for lunch or dinner and make it a sure thing. Despite urgings to change the name of the popular menu item "The Big Bankowski" (every menu item and board for \$250) to "The Entire Maguire", she has resisted. "The Big Bankowski" it stays.

With the help of Chef Chris Lorenz (formerly of Workshop and Charcut), Taste is producing all charcuterie, cured meat, conservas and sausages entirely in-house. Chef Lorenz's charcuterie with our in-house pickled and fermented local vegetables has proven so popular, Taste is now offering larger scale charcuterie/cheese board pick-ups for at home events or dinner parties starting at only \$100 a board. Chef Lorenz also offers a Sunday night sausage making class where you can learn to make sausage, eat sausage and snacks and drink bourbon based cocktails. You also bring home the sausage you make so you can humble-brag to your family. What could be better? 
In the wine department, Taste has come up with an ingenious plan to keep things interesting in the small space with almost no storage capabilities.
