As of now we can confirm that the April 1 Jazz Night and April 5 Potluck will be cancelled.


#### **Special Events**

We have a lot of special events planned from mid-April to early May in addition to our regular events. There is an interesting heritage presentation on Wednesday, April 15. Embrace Gardening is on Tuesday, April 21. The kick-off meeting of our new Neighbourhood Watch is on Tuesday, April 28. We have a special Saturday Night Jazz event on Saturday, May 2. The 2020 Pathway and River Clean Up is on Sunday, May 3 followed by the regular potluck that evening. Finally, there is a Safeworks information evening on Monday, May 4.

We hope you will take advantage of these events. I was at a city-wide community event on March 6. A lady there told me that our community has wonderful events. We hope you appreciate that.

#### Local Area Plan Process Includes Our Community

You may have noticed the City of Calgary ad in the March newsletter on page nine. It talks about a Local Area Plan process that is just starting and that includes our community. This process will result in a new planning statute that will cover all of the communities shown on the map in that area and that will replace our two Area Redevelopment Plans (Cliff Bungalow ARP and Mission ARP). What has changed on that map since the newsletter was published is the recent inclusion of Rideau Roxboro community, which makes eminent sense.



We attended a couple of information sessions in February. Our community association and all community associations in the area will have one representative on the working group. The Business Improvement Areas (e.g. 4th Street) will also have one representative each. Then there will be quite a few public-at-large members on the working group that will be picked by the City from people who applied online.

Based on those information sessions, there is now a name for this area – West Elbow. We expect the process will formally start in April. Based on the information they provided at the information sessions, this process is scheduled to be completed in the third quarter of 2021. Ultimately, it will go to a public hearing of City Council.

Also, in the March newsletter on page 12 was another City of Calgary ad that talks about a new planning document -Guidebook for Great Communities. This will have a significant impact on all Calgary communities including our own. It will be a starting point for the new Local Area planning process. It was considered on March 4 by a City committee called Planning and Urban Development. We submitted a letter and made a presentation to the committee. A key concern we expressed was the lack of heritage policies in the document. As we are a heritage community, this is very important to us. This document will go to a public hearing of City Council on Monday April 27. Anyone can submit a letter or speak at this hearing.

# Local designer creates stylish new apartments in the renovated Bannerman Block

#### Bannerman Block - 2306 4th Street

When Certus Developments embarked on their renovation of the circa-1911 Bannerman Block, they hired local designer Nam Dang Mitchell to completely redo the residential units on the second floor of the building. The entire level was gutted and redesigned with three new 1-bedroom apartments in the 500-670 square foot range. Original brick walls were exposed, wide-plank oak floors laid down and new historically appropriate windows installed.

"We kept the design in the apartments modern and simple, with a focus on beautiful natural materials," explains Mitchell. Each of the units is unique, with white oak cabinetry and marble countertops in one unit and simple white cabinets and silver limestone countertops in one of the others. Check out the accompanying photos to see how the second floor of the 109-year-old Bannerman Block now boasts some of the most stylish residences in the community.

#### Riverwalk Seniors Supportive Living – 528 25 Avenue SW



You may have wondered why – given that the earlier condo building was demolished last summer – excavation of the underground parkade has not yet begun on this project. One reason has been the drilling of over 50 wells to a depth of around 500 feet for a geo-exchange field that will provide clean and efficient heating and cooling to the new 12-storey tower. The geo-exchange system, which utilizes natural heat from the earth, will also keep the driveways, pedestrian ramps, sidewalks and the parkade ramp clear of snow and ice.

This process was nearing completion by late February and the developers were expecting the excavation, shoring and foundation work to begin by mid-March. Their current construction timeline calls for project completion in the fall of 2022.

# Harm Reduction and **Supervised Consumption Services Information Session**


Harm reduction refers to policies, programs and practices that aim to reduce risks and harm associated with the use of psychoactive substances. It acknowledges that abstinence is not always a realistic goal for some people. It is about meeting people where they are and identifying the goals they wish to achieve based on their individual needs and circumstances.

Harm reduction principles recognize the inherent value of human beings and the importance of an inclusive community that can support people who use substances with compassion. People who feel supported and part of a community, rather than isolated, are more likely to seek help when they need it.

Harm reduction interventions may be targeted at the person, family, community or society. They can include harm reduction supply distribution, overdose response training and community-based naloxone kits, and supervised consumption services.

Please join staff from Safeworks Connect, the supervised consumption service outreach team, to learn more about the response to the opioid overdose crisis on May 4 at 7:00 pm at the Cliff Bungalow Mission Community Hall.

#### **About the Heritage Conservation Policy Tools and Financial Incentives Review**

Since the Calgary Heritage Strategy was implemented in 2008, Heritage Planning has worked collaboratively to implement a majority of the strategy's 30+ action items. This includes creation of the online Inventory of Evaluated Historic Resources, establishment of the current Historic Resource Conservation Grant Program and the legal protection of over 100 identified heritage sites.

In March 2019, Council directed Heritage Planning to review potential new policy tools and financial incentives to further increase the conservation of heritage resources, - supporting Calgary's Next Generation Planning projects and responding to the loss of the Enoch Sales Residence to fire in early 2019.

Heritage Planning is developing a range of options through research, consultant analysis and targeted stakeholder engagement. After receiving Council's direction on which options to pursue further, Heritage Planning will work on implementing the supported tools, including further stakeholder input.

For more information on the recommendations being presented at the SPC on Planning and Urban Development Committee meeting on April 1, 2020, and to review the summary report, visit the "Heritage conservation incentives and programs" page at www.calgary.ca.

This report is slated to go to City Council on April 27th, 2020, along with the Guidebook for Great Communities and the North Hill Communities Local Area Plan - a new multi community plan encompassing many historic neighbourhoods that is acting as a pilot for implementation of the Guidebook. The Guidebook will influence redevelopment of our existing communities and direct changes to the Land Use Bylaw. Currently, the Guidebook and North Hill plan contain placeholders for future heritage policy. If Council approves the recommendations for additional heritage tools and incentives, including new policy for heritage residential districts, development and implementation is still about a year out. The recommendations in the report represent the most significant advancement in heritage policy for the City of Calgary in over a decade and will undoubtedly shape the balanced redevelopment and preservation of our older residential communities for decades to come.

Our speaker, Heritage Planner Alastair Pollock will present a summary of the report and questions from the floor will be addressed. Groups like The Calgary Heritage Initiative. Calgarians for Heritage Districts, applicable Community Associations and individual residents have some concerns with the Guidebook, North Hill plan and heritage policy. It's essential that the Councillors hear these concerns, and understand that the public is behind the strengthening of heritage policy.

## **Why Food Scraps Are Too Good to Waste**

Did you know that food scraps and yard waste do NOT turn into soil in the landfill? Instead, it sits for a very long time and slowly breaks down, creating leachate (a toxic liquid that needs to be treated) and greenhouse gases like methane.

Pictured here are items from the 1970s, uncovered at a Calgary landfill almost 40 years later. These chicken bones, grass clippings and newspapers look very much the same as they did when they were put in the garbage, taking up valuable landfill space and creating harmful emissions.







Composting your food scraps and yard waste means we can:

- Create nutrient-rich compost to help new plants grow
- Conserves our precious landfill space for future generations
- Prevent harmful environmental emissions

Spring has arrived and I am as excited as you are to get outdoors, enjoy the longer days and take advantage of our pathways, green spaces and great facilities for recreation.

As the temperatures rise, I understand far too well that flood risk and mitigation is top of mind for many in our Ward 11 communities. It is remarkable to think that it has been nearly seven years since the flood of 2013. As a city, we must remain vigilant and protect our communities from a repeat event—as it is not a matter of if, but when.

With no resolution from the federal government on upstream mitigation, I am looking to the City to see what is within our municipal scope for smaller flood mitigation projects. I would encourage you to send your feedback into my office, as well as to your local Community Association. These associations provide a bevy of resources and information for all community-related matters, fueled by the hearts and hands of terrific volunteers.

You can also visit calgary.ca/floodinfo to sign up for updates and to learn what you can do as an individual to reduce flood risk. Remember that Calgary is at the highest risk from May 15 through July 15 and we must act swiftly in the event of a flood, as our close proximity to the rivers and mountains leaves us with little warning.
